Gladys Arias, MPA, is a Principal for Health Equity Policy Analysis and Legislative Support at the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN), the American Cancer Society's nonprofit, nonpartisan advocacy affiliate. Anabella Aspiras, MPA, RN, BSN

Anabella Aspiras, MPA, RN, BSN, serves as the Assistant Director for Engagement on the Biden Cancer Moonshot, which the President and First Lady reignited to mobilize a national effort to end cancer as we know it. As Assistant Director for Engagement, Anabella works with patients, caregivers, healthcare providers, academic institutions, foundations, and industry to advance the ambitious goals of the Cancer Moonshot: (1) to reduce the death rate from cancer by at least 50 percent over the next 25 years, and (2) to improve the experience of people and their families living with and surviving cancer. Anabella was part of the Cancer Moonshot team in 2016 under (then) Vice-President Biden.

Prior to rejoining the Cancer Moonshot, Anabella served as the Chief of Staff at Mendel AI, a health-tech start-up leveraging clinical AI in the service of patients. Before Mendel, Anabella worked at Flatiron Health, where she led clinical abstraction operations to support the development of real-world data to inform oncology practice and policy. Anabella also launched a non-profit, Diversify Health, dedicated to establishing pathways for historically underrepresented groups to join, enrich, and lead the future of healthcare.

A nurse by training, Anabella's work has covered a wide range of settings, from Sierra Leone during the 2015 Ebola outbreak, to working on the frontlines of the COVID response in New York City at the start of the pandemic in 2020.





Alan J. Balch, PhD

Alan J. Balch, PhD, has over 20 years of executive leadership in the nonprofit sector, focusing on advocacy areas such as access and affordability, health equity, prevention and early detection, and cancer research. Since 2013, he has served as the CEO of both the Patient Advocate Foundation (PAF) and the National Patient Advocate Foundation (NPAF), after being a board member since 2007. From 2006 to 2013, Dr. Balch was Vice President of the Preventive Health Partnership, a national collaboration between the American Cancer Society, American Diabetes Association, and American Heart Association. Prior to that, he was Executive Director of Friends of Cancer Research.

Dr. Balch has held leadership roles on numerous selective boards, steering committees, and councils, including the National Academies of Medicine, National Quality Forum, National Committee for Quality Assurance, and the Institute for Clinical and Economic Review. Recently, he was appointed Chair of the Global Patient Council for the International Society for Health Economics and Outcomes Research (ISPOR).

In addition to his leadership roles, Dr. Balch serves on editorial and advisory boards, including the Journal of Clinical Pathways and the Journal of Oncology Navigation and Survivorship. He is also a frequent peer reviewer for journals such as the Journal of Clinical Oncology and the American Journal of Public Health.



Tracy Battaglia, MD, MPH

Tracy Battaglia, MD, MPH, a renowned physician-scientist, champions health equity through innovative approaches and community engagement. With 23 years at Boston University, she led initiatives at Boston Medical Center, addressing health disparities. As Professor of Medicine and Community Health Sciences, she directed key centers and spearheaded community engagement at BU's Clinical Translational Science Institute. Her research focuses on equitable access to cancer care, notably through Patient Navigation programs. A two-time cancer survivor herself, Dr. Battaglia brings personal insight to her work. Recently, she joined Yale Cancer Center as Associate Director for Cancer Care Equity.

Jennifer Elston Lafata, PhD, is Professor with tenure in the Division of Pharmaceutical Outcomes and Policy and co-lead for the UNC Cancer Care Quality Initiative. She holds an adjunct appointment with the Department of Health Policy and Management at UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health and serves as an Improvement Advisor with UNC Health's Office of Quality Excellence/Basnight Cancer Hospital and Cancer Services. As a health services researcher with a commitment to patient-centered care, her research is at the forefront of improving cancer care quality by identifying and addressing gaps in care delivery within healthcare organizations. She uses diverse methodologies, including quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods, to assess patient-reported needs, especially following provider recommendations, and the impacts of these needs on patient adherence and health outcomes.

Her work has been instrumental in developing and implementing population-based interventions aimed at enhancing care quality. As a practice-embedded health services researcher, she leverages health system data, including electronic health records, patient surveys, and office visit audio recordings, to identify and address multi-level factors affecting care quality. This work has resulted in the creation of decision support tools for both patients and providers, aiming to improve patient adherence to recommended care and to enhance overall care delivery.

Key areas of her current research include evaluating interventions to prevent acute care events among oncology patients, assessing the accessibility, equity and effectiveness of oncology integrated telehealth visits, and understanding shared decision-making processes in the context of lung cancer screening and other cancer care delivery. She is currently leading a project funded by AHRQ to develop a patient-reported measure of shared decision-making.





Tracie Lewis, MS

Tracie Lewis, MS, is the Operations Director for the Colorectal Cancer Prevention Network at the University of South Carolina. Ms. Lewis joined the Network in 2017 and currently oversees their statewide patient navigation program and other grant initiatives to increase colorectal cancer awareness and access to timely screening. He plays a vital role in shaping cancer care nationally through his involvement with the Commission on Cancer and the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO). Dr. Liu has led initiatives to implement RN navigation programs across cancer centers and is currently spearheading efforts to integrate community health workers into care teams. His commitment to advancing high-quality healthcare extends to his service on various national committees, including ASCO's Survivorship Task Force and the American Cancer Society's Evidence-Based Promising Practice Task Force.

Julie McMahon, MPH, is Director, Patient Navigation, at Susan G. Zarek's passion in serving the under-represented and historically excluded communities has led to addressing various needs such as food insecurity, cold capping, grant funding, screening and prevention, integrative medicine, as well as financial toxicity. Her experience as a stage 4 colon cancer survivor, caregiver and knowledgeable professional provides much-needed first hand representation in the field of patient navigation.





Angelo Moore, PhD, RN, NE-BC, FAAN

Angelo Moore, PhD, RN, NE-BC, FAAN, is the Founding Execuitve Director of the Center of Excellence for Integrative Health Disparities and Equity Research (CIHDER) North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University, where he is responsible for designing research projects and attracting federal and other research funding, assuring operational efficiency, implementation of research and outreach programs and services, the dissemination of research findings, developing professional partnerships to expand networks for outreach and educational awareness in targeted health areas, providing leadership to ensure achievement of major goals, strategies and performance targets, overseeing the management of CIHDER's budget, building partnerships with potential donors to create new revenue streams to ensure the financial sustainability of CIHDER. He also is Associate Professor in the School of Nursing.

He previously served as the Director, Office of Health Equity, Duke Cancer Institute (DCI), where he provided overall direction, coordination, and implementation DCI's community impact-designed projects to reduce cancer outcomes disparities in the DCI community and across its Catchment Area. He was responsible for: (1) Engaging meaningfully, respectfully, and collaboratively with community partners, (2) Building strong, bidirectional partnerships between our community and DCI cancer researchers, and (3) Developing a multi-level, prospective data infrastructure to guide community-DCI partnerships. He worked to achieve DCI's mission to reduce cancer disparities and improve population health in DCI catchment area for historically marginalized and medically underserved populations such as the African American, LatinX, Asian American, Native American, Jewish, Muslim, LGBTQ+, refugee, and rural communities. Dr. Moore led the Community-Facing Navigation program at Duke Cancer Institute who operated in the community by providing cancer education on prevention, early detection screening, navigating individuals needing cancer screenings, following up for abnormal screenings to diagnostic testing, and navigating patients into treatment if diagnosed with cancer. He is a member of the National Navigation Roundtable Steering Committee, and also serves on the Evidence Based Promising Practices Task Group and the Membership Committee.

Dr. Moore is also an Adjunct Associate Professor at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill School of Nursing and serves on the America250 Health & Wellness Advisory Council, National Black Nurses Association Board of Directors, NC Advisory Council Cancer Coordination Control Early Detection Subcommittee, and numerous other committees.





Bonny Morris, PhD, MSPH, RN

Bonny Morris, PhD, MSPH, RN, is a behavioral scientist and Vice President of Navigation at the American Cancer Society, where she leads the strategy, development, and implementation of navigation programs, including ACS CARES (Community Access to Resources, Education, and Support), ACS LION (Leadership in Oncology Navigation) and the Patient Navigation Initiative capacity-building grants. Her program development and research focus on multi-level strategies integrating digital health and patient navigation to optimize cancer care delivery. The collective goal of this work is to increase equitable access to high quality cancer care by providing strategic patient navigation funding and ACS program support to overcome patient, provider, and system barriers.



Timothy Wm. Mullett, MD, MBA, FACS

Timothy Wm. Mullett, MD, MBA, FACS, is a professor of surgery in the Division of Cardiothoracic Surgery at the University of Kentucky (UK). With over 25 years of experience on the UK faculty, Dr. Mullett focuses his clinical practice and research on addressing the significant burden of lung cancer in Kentucky. He is a member of the UK Markey Cancer Center, the state's only National Cancer Institute-designated cancer center, where he also chairs the cancer committee. Under his leadership, the Commission on Cancer program at UK received the Outstanding Achievement Award in 2017.
