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American Cancer Society National Navigation Roundtable Pulse Survey Patient Navigation Reimbursement Codes

The American Cancer Society National Navigation Roundtable (ACS NNRT) is distributing this brief survey to gather feedback regarding current experiences with the new billing codes developed by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS/PIN Codes) and the American Medical Association (AMA/ CPT Codes) to support the reimbursement of patient navigation services. Also, the new 2025 physician fee schedule proposal has been published. It can be found at the link below and includes a Request For Information asking for feedback on the PIN codes *(see page 213)*.

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The ACS NNRT will use the information gathered via the survey to develop recommendations to improve design and uptake of these codes to be shared with CMS. The survey is designed to gather feedback from <u>both</u> institutions, who <u>are</u> and <u>are not</u> currently implementing the new codes.

If possible, we recommend that team members at the same institution coordinate responses and submit a single response to the survey to avoid duplication. Please


also feel free to share the survey with other institutions, or organizations that operate patient navigation programs.

The ACS NNRT Public Awareness and Communications Task Group has introduced this section in the newsletter to clarify essential patient navigation terminology for professional use. Please review this section in each issue and start incorporating these terms into your patient navigation program.



Patient navigators have been referred to in the past using terms like "lay," "community," "social determinants of health," "non-licensed," and "non clinical." The Professional Oncology Navigation Standards clarify the term "patient navigator" should be used for a professional patient navigator who is not a clinically licensed social worker or nurse, and the terms "non clinical," "lay," etc., should no longer be used.
